UW-Extension Educators have impacts on Green Lake County, including:

- ◆ Education to Green Lake County corn producers that resulted in them gaining \$40-\$60 per acre in gross income through hybrid selection workshops.
- ◆ Coordination of the Green Lake Area Health and Wellness Coalition, which has brought close to \$60,000 in grant money for health education in Green Lake County
- ◆ Developing an adult leadership program that has sixteen students in 2007 and has graduated sixty students in four years.
- ◆ Saving thousands of dollars annually for local non-profit organizations by facilitating their strategic planning efforts.
- ◆ Demonstrating improved methods to resolve public disputes.
- ◆ Providing organizations like 4-H Leaders Association, 4-H Clubs, Green Lake County Horse Council, Livestock Committee and various other school and community groups resources to run their meetings efficiently, market their programs and provide educational tools.
- ◆ Conducting on-farm research trials to address the rising cost of nitrogen fertilizers. Producers saved \$18/acre on nitrogen fertilizer expenses.
- ◆ Serving as advisor to the Green Lake County Association for Home and Community Education (HCE), which provides services including the Wisconsin Bookworms™ literacy program, Make a Difference Day paper product collection and 15 community educational seminars annually.
- ◆ Eight 4-H Ambassadors visited several third grade classrooms throughout the County (Green Lake, Markesan, Princeton and Berlin). The Ambassadors shared information about 4-H and conducted a leadership program with the 150 third graders. The third graders explored what was important to them and why. The 4-H Ambassadors, grades 6-12, gained communication skills and public speaking skills.
- ◆ Monitoring soybean pest infestations that can affect the 22,000 acres of soybeans, snap beans and peas grown in Green Lake County. Results of several research trials have helped Green Lake County producers save money.
- ◆ Providing evidence-based parenting programs that have been shown to reduce the onset of adolescent substance abuse and promote family communication and support.
- ◆ Thirty-six 4-H youth and 10 adult volunteers attended Officer Leadership Training recently. Participants were encouraged to explore their roles as club officers, practice parliamentary procedures and practice teamwork activities to share with their clubs. 100% of participants agreed that meeting made them more confident in conducting their meetings and being in club leadership roles.

Extension’s Local Presence Strengthens Services to Green Lake County Residents

For more than 75 years, UW-Extension has partnered with local government and communities to provide a valuable, accessible and responsive educational system in Green Lake County. During 2008, Green Lake County is projected to contribute \$217,504 to help fund this partnership, while the University will provide \$112,995 of revenue in the form of faculty salaries and benefits for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.

Impact On Community Issues

Locally-based faculty and academic staff address community issues that are identified by organizations, community, county, state and national assessments. Their tailored responses affect all citizens of Green Lake County and result in significant impacts, such as:

● decreased juvenile delinquency	● leadership development

● increased civic engagement of youth	● agriculture development

Substantial Community Capacity Building for the Investment

UW-Extension has built capacity in Green Lake County and local communities by delivering educational programs and facilitating planning processes for county departments, organizations, businesses, and local governments creating a return on your county investment.

Additional Investment without Added Cost

Educators work proactively and serve as catalysts to empower local leaders. Community needs often require an extended period of time to be successfully addressed, and the trust-based relationship built by their local presence is essential for this to occur. This presence is created, in part, because last year staff worked **overtime hours valued at \$35,227** without receiving overtime pay.

Outreach Touches Residents in Every Community

Extension’s work often relies on personal relationships and trust developed over time between local educators, clientele, and communities. Last year, these relationships touched 1 of every 4 residents in Green Lake County.

Local Educators Connect to Broader University Resources

The University of Wisconsin Invests in Green Lake County—The University provides \$343,784 of indirect state and federal support of our Green Lake County Educators. This support is given to be ready to meet county needs. Ongoing professional development is funded by the University and brings an additional \$3,000 in to Green Lake County. This allows educators to study and address rapidly emerging issues. Our connection to the University of Wisconsin brings these to Green Lake County:
