



4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PRINCIPLES OF PRACTICE

Guiding Philosophy for 4-H Youth Development Professionals

January 2008

1. 4-H Youth Development programs at all levels are conducted under the authority of Cooperative Extension and the United States Department of Agriculture
 - a. Local & County level 4-H Youth Development programs and 4-H Youth Development volunteers are accountable to the County UW-Extension professionals responsible for 4-H Youth Development programs
 - b. 4-H Youth Development groups/clubs and volunteers operate under the guidance and control of Cooperative Extension
 - c. Use of the 4-H name and emblem is protected by law, and controlled by Cooperative Extension
2. 4-H Youth Development programs must comply with University and National 4-H policies, and state and federal law
3. 4-H Youth Development's principle outcome is positive youth development
 - a. Programs should provide appropriate challenge and risk – while making safety a priority
 - b. Everyone can succeed in 4-H – support should be available to promote success
 - c. Young people should be encouraged to make their own decisions in 4-H Youth Development, both individually and collectively, and should be allowed to sometimes fail, within an environment of safety and support
 - d. 4-H Youth Development is flexible enough to accommodate many different needs & interests
 - e. 4-H Youth Development values academic achievement and problem prevention, but those are not the primary objectives of our programs
 - f. 4-H Youth Development values and encourages the involvement of parents with their children
 - g. 4-H Youth Development delivers programs through a variety of methods and groups
4. 4-H Youth Development programs are public
 - a. Programs are intended to advance the public good
 - b. Programs and activities are open to all
 - c. Programs and activities should be visible to the public
 - d. Program participation should not be limited to family activities
 - e. 4-H Youth Development provides opportunities for youth to have experiences beyond their family, and to interact with caring adults who are not family
5. 4-H Youth Development respects and encourages youth voice
 - a. Youth and adults work as partners
 - b. Young people have rights
 - c. Young people should be treated with dignity
6. 4-H Youth Development programs and groups are inclusive
 - a. Policies, practices, and images that limit participation must be avoided
 - b. Programs and activities should promote a sense of "belonging" for all
 - c. 4-H Youth Development programs and activities should strive to always provide a welcoming and respectful environment
 - d. 4-H Youth Development does not exclude children whose parents are not involved

7. Serving as a 4-H Youth Development volunteer is a privilege, not a right
 - a. Persons wishing to become or continue as a volunteer leader must comply with Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development Volunteer Behavior Expectations
 - b. Cooperative Extension has the authority to decide whether or not a person is suitable to serve as a 4-H Youth Development volunteer
 - c. Cooperative Extension has the authority to discipline or remove volunteers
8. 4-H Youth Development programs for youth are delivered primarily through volunteers
 - a. Paid staff develop and manage a system where volunteers work with youth
 - b. Paid staff rarely lead or advise youth groups or clubs on a continuing basis
 - c. New programs should be designed to be led by volunteers
 - d. 4-H Youth Development provides volunteers with opportunities for personal growth and satisfaction
9. 4-H Youth Development programs are non-formal, primarily offered during out-of-school time
 - a. 4-H Youth Development partners with schools, but is not a substitute for them
 - b. 4-H Youth Development employees are not classroom workers or school teachers
10. Local decision making within 4-H Youth Development is important and preferred
 - a. Youth should be involved in decisions affecting them
 - b. Respectful, fair, and open decision making processes should be used
 - c. Cooperative Extension has ultimate responsibility and authority
