Juneau County Master Gardeners officially became the 45th member of the WIMGA in 2006 - (Wisconsin Master Gardener Association). But just what is WIMGA and why belong to it?

First here's a bit of history. The WIMGA was formed in 1992 by MGs from around the State as a result of a Statewide meeting held in Stevens Point.

The original Extension Master Gardener Program was created in Washington State as a way to help the Extension handle all the horticultural questions being asked by the public. In exchange for educational training by the Extension, MGs returned volunteer hours to the Extension for horticultural outreach.

In Wisconsin, Dr. Helen Harrison, Professor at UW-Madison brought the MG Program to the State. She worked with Dr. Bob Tomesh, Professor at UW River Falls to make the program a reality.

Milwaukee and Waukesha Counties started their program in 1977 (SEW - Southeast Wisconsin). Brown County began in 1979 (NEW - Northeast Wisconsin), Dane County (MAMG) in 1981, the Fox Valley Area in 1986 and Portage County MG in 1990. Other areas around the state have continued to develop. Juneau County was the most recent addition in October, 2006.

In July 1999 a new position of MG Program Coordinator was established by UWEX with encouragement from WIMGA to address growing needs throughout the state. Susan Mahr was selected to work with the Program and coordinate closely with the WIMGA.

In October 2002 the Board was restructured because the Board was getting too large to operate efficiently. The State was

divided into six districts, conforming to existing UWEX districts, with two District Directors from each district and three At-Large positions providing representation for all MGs.

The mission of the WIMGA is to support and provide leadership to individuals and local organizations in their mission to assist UWEX in community horticultural programs through volunteerism, education, and environmental stewardship.

There are many local MG associations that belong to the WIMGA - see the "Local Associations" section of the website for more information on these. The WIMGA website is: <http://www.hort.wisc.edu/mastergardener/>

Belonging to WIMGA allows Wisconsin MGs to jointly combine their resources to:

- Provide a common advocate, message and representative for all Wisconsin MGs. This includes communicating and interacting with UW-Ext, the National MG Program and State Government.
- Assist in the formation of local Wisconsin MG organizations by defining and providing a common organizational methodology and structure for those groups.
- Ensure the Statewide growth and success of the Wisconsin MG program. WIMGA provides long-range strategic planning and implements tactics to achieve that goal.
- Provide a common communication link and ability to share resources between all Wisconsin MGs. This is done in many ways, including communication between: the WIMGA Board, District Directors, Association Representatives, and the WIMGA Newsletter. In addition, WIMGA provides resources and coordination help to local groups to enable them to host events, e.g. Annual State Meeting/Conference and MG Tri-State Conference in Wisconsin.
- Acts as an advocate to strengthen and improve MG training through representation on UW-Ext MG Advisory Committee and close coordination with the State MG Coordinator.

June Gardening Tips



June is the dairy month and what could be better than fresh strawberries and ice cream – the best of this month’s traditional fare. While this season seems slow to get going and my strawberry plants are first blooming they are available in the produce section at stores. Handled gently, they are a treat just eating fresh, atop shortcake, over ice cream, or persevered as a jam or jelly by themselves or combined with other fruit for example rhubarb. When harvesting rhubarb don’t take all the stalks at one picking this would weaken the plant and reduce the size of future harvest. See the rhubarb recipes below submitted by Rich Milgrom.

Summer begins June 20 and hopefully by then no more worries of cold weather. Grass is green – it hasn’t had a chance to burn up in the hot sun yet. Unfortunately, the weeds are doing great. There are a few weed management strategies that can be implemented in the early season that will reduce the hours of hand-weeding and hoeing later in the growing season. The old saying “an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure” holds true in the case of weeds. Consider all potential sources of weed seed and make sure when you plant seeds they are free from contamination with weed seed. This information is listed on the seed packet. Consider the source of any soil or compost used in transplanting or amending the garden soil. Finally, prevent weed seed production in areas surrounding the flower and vegetable gardens by mowing weeds prior to flowering.

By now your vegetable garden (weed free, I hope) should be planted and into the early growing stage. Don’t forget you can still plant peas, beans, radish, beets, carrots, even cole crops this month or even next for a repeated later harvest. This will extend your growing season for those freshest vegetable just for the table. One vegetable that you should be finished harvesting is the asparagus. They need the rest time now to rejuvenate for next year. So leave them grow now and fertilize the plantings with 10-10-10 fertilizer.

Flower beds require routine maintenance now to keep it looking good. The greenery from spring bulb flowers should be dry looking now and can be cut and removed – but don’t pull, you could very easily pull out the bulb. Dead head flowers as they fade and cut the iris stalks after blossoming finishes. Pinch back chrysanthemums to half of its height to promote fuller, denser growth. Flower buds will form on new growth and be ready for a fall showy display of color.

RHUBARB NUT BREAD

1 ½ Cups Brown Sugar
2/3 Cup Oil
1 Egg
1 Cup Sour Milk (add 1 Tbsp vinegar or lemon juice to milk for sour milk)
1 tsp Salt
1 tsp Baking Soda
1 tsp Vanilla
2 ½ Cups Flour
1 ½ Cups Diced Rhubarb
½ Cups Chopped Nuts

Stir ingredients together in order given above.
Pour into 2 well greased & floured loaf pans (2/3 full)
Sprinkle with topping
½ cup sugar
1 Tbsp butter
Cream together and spread over each loaf
Bake for 40 - 55 minutes @ 325°

RHUBARB CAKE

Preheat oven to 375°
Use a 12” x 18” pan
Mix 2 cups heavy whipping cream and 2 cup sugar. Allow to dissolve.
Mix one box yellow cake according to package directions and pour into pan.
Add 5 cups rhubarb to top.
Pour cream/sugar mixture on top.
Bake for 45 minutes @ 375°

- **Hilling potatoes** encourages the development of stolens (underground runners) upon which potato tubers form, thus greatly improving production. After the potatoes break the surface of the ground, gradually build up a low ridge of loose soil by cultivation and hoeing toward the plants. This ridge, which may become four to 6 inches high by summer, reduces the number of sunburned (greened) tubers, eliminates competition from weeds and also loosens and aerates the soil. Use caution when hoeing near potato plants because developing tubers are easily cut and ruined.
- The **Jerusalem artichoke** has yellow flowers and looks much like a sunflower. They are vigorous growers, meaning you're more likely to end up with excessive quantities of plants and tubers than too few. In fact Jerusalem artichokes can be hard to eradicate once they take up residence in your garden. Similar to water chestnuts in taste, the traditional use of the tuber is as a gourmet vegetable. The tubers resemble potatoes except that most of the carbohydrates in the tubers are in the form of inulin rather than starch. Once the tubers are stored in the ground or refrigerated the inulin is converted to fructose and the tubers develop a much sweeter taste. If you're interested in growing Jerusalem artichokes, the tubers are widely available from mail-order seed companies.
- The **emerald ash borer** was discovered in Michigan in June 2002. It's a species of metallic wood boring beetle that attacks ash trees, usually killing them in 1 to 3 years. To date the random peeling of ash logs by the Wisconsin DNR has revealed no signs of emerald ash borer in Wisconsin. Interestingly, the emerald ash borer has created quite an interest in "little green bugs". For more information on the emerald ash borer and the green look-alikes go to: www.entomology.wisc.edu/emeraldashborer/. This UW-Madison Entomology department web site includes pictures of EAB, look-alikes, ash tree identification, ash tree damage symptoms and other information.
- When you're finished using a pesticide sprayer be sure to clean your equipment thoroughly. Partially fill the sprayer with water, shake, and spray the rinse water onto the treatment area. Repeat this process two more times before properly storing the sprayer. Never open a sprayer when its contents are under pressure. The owner's manual will tell you how to relieve the pressure. In commercial settings, to avoid contamination, sprayers are often cleaned using ammonia and/or detergent as instructed on the label. For homeowners, it's usually easier and less risky to just keep several sprayers on hand for different jobs. For example, one sprayer for herbicide applications and one for insecticide applications. Remember to wear proper personal protective clothing and equipment when applying pesticides.
