The **Waupaca County Integrated Service Project** is a process used to improve the lives of children and families who have complex needs and who are involved with multiple agencies. This program began in 1996 as a result of Bureau of Community Health System Change Grant.

The process is a strengthened based and child focus on those things that the family does well, while building strategies for areas of need identified. The family team is essential. The team can include providers, friends, school, law enforcement and other community representatives. A plan developed by the team is individualized using resources from the community. The plan also prepares a strong network for sustainable support for the child and family.

ISP Mission

The mission of the Integrated Service Project is to maintain children with serious needs that work with multiple agency in a family setting. The project partners believe that a healthy family setting is the key to a child's growth. They are committed to a working partnership with families and other agencies to achieve this mission.
