A selected few of these abstracts were used previously in a bibliography produced for Environment Canada in 1995. Only the most recent materials have been scanned. The Internet was not scanned but should be considered to be a valuable resource (as an example, most Canadian government documents are available on Environment Canada's Green Lane).
