<p>Grants Information Center, UW Madison</p>	<p>The Grants Information Center is located in <u>Memorial Library</u> at the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus. It is one of a network of approximately 200 collections established by the <u>Foundation Center</u>, an independent national service organization in New York, to provide an authoritative source of information on foundation and corporate giving for nonprofit organizations. Nonprofit organizations looking for grants will usually want to begin at <u>Resources for Nonprofit Organizations</u>.</p> <p>Two similar Foundation Center Cooperating Collections in Wisconsin include the <u>Funding Information Center</u>, located at Marquette University in Milwaukee and the <u>Foundation Collection</u> at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point Library.</p> <p>In addition to publications from the Foundation Center, including its computerized database, FC Search, the Grants Information Center at Memorial Library includes other sources of information in both print and electronic format on private and corporate foundations and federal funding agencies. Supplemented by other campus collections, users can also find books, periodicals, and pamphlets and a sampling of videos on fund raising, proposal writing, and philanthropy.</p> <p>Any member of the public seeking information on grants may use the center. <p>Pay It Forward Foundation</p>	<p>The Pay It Forward Foundation administers a mini-grant program (up to \$500) for Pay It Forward activities involving youths of all ages. A Pay It Forward project is defined as one or more service activities that benefit the youths' school, neighborhood, or greater community, and include learning goals for the youth participants. Mini-grants will be available on a first come, first serve basis and will be distributed monthly. The grant deadline is the 15th of each month (September through June). Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF)	<p>Visit their “Applying for a Grant” web site at http://www.rwjf.org/applying/index.jhtml</p> <p>State tobacco policy advocacy grants: approximately \$12 million will be available to support professional staff and other infrastructure, public education, advocacy, outreach, and technical assistance for tobacco policy change initiatives at either the regional, state or community level. The program seeks to support diverse partnerships in communities and states, with a particular emphasis on the populations most affected by tobacco use and secondhand smoke exposure. Applicant organizations are required to have significant experience in policy advocacy; however, prior experience in tobacco prevention and cessation is not required to be eligible for RWJF funding. The call for proposals (CFP) will be posted on July 15, 2004 at: www.rwjf.org/tobaccopolicychange. There will be no printed version of the CFP. Electronic applications will be accepted through 3:00 p.m. E.D.T. on September 1, 2004 at www.rwjf.org/tobaccopolicychange. It is anticipated that there will be 3 competitive grant application cycles -- 1 per year for 3 years -- under this program. Applicants that request more than \$50,000 will need to demonstrate other funding sources for each dollar requested above \$50,000. Grants will be 12 months in duration.</p>
Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)	<p>States, tribes, community and faith-based organizations, and others can apply for grants. This year, many new funding opportunities will be available. To provide an overview of the grants application process and direct interested parties to the latest information on its discretionary grants, SAMHSA has produced a short webcast.
